April saw another highly successful Anzac Day commemoration. Attendance at all three activities – Dawn Service, March and Main Service – continues to grow with gratifying emphasis on the attendance and involvement of young people.

Major efforts were the Q150 'Big Bash' and the Inaugural BWMCA Quiet Achiever Awards. Reports on both these events appear later in the Newsletter but a synopsis would be – "highly successful in spite of the disappointing weather. Community groups really networking and community heroes getting long due recognition for their great efforts."

On a more pragmatic front, the major Hall renovations – the floor and roof repairs – have been carried out and the most urgent repairs on the roof of the toilet area will commence very shortly.

We are lucky to live in a community that really epitomises that overused phrase 'community spirit'.

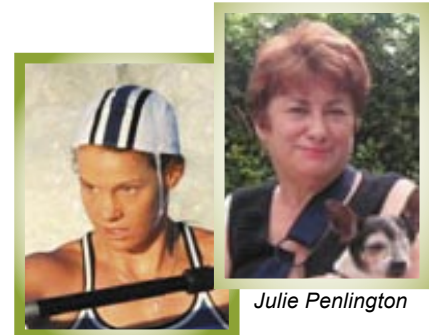

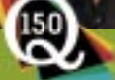

The indoor entertainments were often standing room only. Craft Cottage and Sunshine Art Group reported a steady stream of visitors. On Saturday the road outside the Oval was jammed with traffic and parking on the street and in Kingsbridge was at a premium. It was estimated that between 2-3,000 people visited the Oval through the weekend even though the weather was so bad on the Sunday that we had to close at lunchtime as many of the marquees were flooded and the slippery ground was just too hazardous for the few stalwart visitors that were still arriving.

And we certainly put a spotlight on Buderim. Our media partners did us proud. ABC Coast FM, Sunshine FM, Channel 7, Sunshine Coast Daily, Buderim Weekly and Buderim Chronicle gave us an incredible amount of air time and print pages. So much so that the Q150 office of State Govt rang to say they were being 'deluged' with media releases and emailed their congratulations!

We are extremely grateful to the Q150 office of State Government and to Sunshine Coast Regional Council whose generous grants made the Bash possible. But the real thanks must go to the indefatigable committee and helpers, who spent a year going way outside their comfort zones to put every detail in place and to the liaison officers who went far beyond the call of duty to make sure the dreadful weather didn't cause too many heartaches – especially John McMahon and Graeme Ensell.

And biggest thanks of all to the 59 great community groups who showed everyone why Buderim is such a special place.

OLD POST OFFICE MANAGEMENT

The final stage of the renovations to the OPO have recently been completed.

New signage on both the exterior and interior of the building has been updated in order to better reflect what the building actually represents - the registered office of the BWMCA and the local community information centre, and how it came about - by generous donations from the public. A plaque inside the office also explains that the cost of ongoing maintenance comes from the interest accrued from the Bob Mellor bequest.

A new sink and cabinet unit has also been installed in the kitchen to complete the renovation project. I would like to acknowledge the tremendous help of Graeme Ensoll in having the kitchen upgrade carried out.

Visitor numbers to the OPO for the first six months of this year have shown a decline when compared to the same period last year.

Year-to-date till the end of June, we have handled 3531 enquiries compared to 3724 for the same period last year. Locals accounted for 60% of these enquiries, with visitors making up the remainder.

To celebrate the fact that the OPO will have been operating for ten years - it was officially opened on 1 October 1999 - we are planning a small celebratory function (Buderim's Little Bash?) to take place on 1 October this year.

We are still looking for new volunteers to help us out with our daily rosters. If you know of anyone who may be able to spare three or maybe six hours a month, then we would very much like to hear from them.

The roof and floor of the Hall are now both secure for the next 100 years and so we can turn our attention to the toilet roof!

Unfortunately the inside of the toilets may have to wait for funding to be secured to refurbish them, but we are hopeful of having a new roof over the toilet area as soon as we can finalise quotes. There will be no skylights in the new roof.

The floor, roof, ramp and step repairs (\$130,000+) have taken all our cash reserves at the moment and we are looking for fund raising ideas and people and groups who can carry them off. If you can help in any way please let us know.

Bookings are very sound for the rest of this year and into next year. Increases in water and electricity will no doubt see an increase in rents charged in future.

We are very grateful to BATS Theatre Co Inc for their generous agreement to pay half the cost of installing a shutter in the Bio Box in place of the sliding window that had become a hazard.

You will also notice the revamp of the Hall noticeboards to advertise the Association and Buderim Foundation. There are new rules for attaching signs to the boards.

Four Committee Members attended the State LAC conference at Caloundra in May, with lectures and workshops re Grant applications; Safety & Insurance; GST; Media; Volunteer Portal, and duties as Office Bearers.

Speakers on health care anticipate a change from expecting care by 2020. By that date it is estimated there will be more people needing health care than health care workers. Self management of health will be more to the fore. In many areas, peer trainers will assist specialist carers with the ongoing management and treatment of those in need, allowing better use of people, resources and evolving knowledge.

One professor said that our Buderim CPR sessions are virtually the cutting edge of future care & training. With such diseases as overweight, obesity, smoking, harmful drinking and with the poor health of indigenous people, it was stressed that *prevention* must be more effective.

Basic CPR awareness classes have been postponed due to Swine Flu. Future classes will be advertised in Buderim Chronicle, Buderim Weekly, 104.9 FM Radio and at the OPO.

The new QAS Mercedes emergency vehicle and LAC marquee attracted many visitors at the QI 50 Celebrations. Your Buderim LAC has, from fund-raising and donations, purchased approx. \$240,000 of extra equipment since inception in 1992.
